However, this powerful technology can be misused and createries tening risks. Terrorist groups have been early adopters of emerging technologies: they already utilize socials network online gaming platforms, and other digital tools for radicalization, recruitment and coordination.

But Artificial Intelligence also provides powerful new opportunities for countements at both operational and strategic levels.

It allows your serices to effectively process and analyze massive amounts of data, detect patterns of suspicious activities and inform strategic decisions more rapidly and accurately.

However, achieving this still requires a serious investment in capacity building, and clos collaboration between public authorities, the private sector, academia, and civil society.

In this regard, I would like to recall the adoption on 21 March by the General Assembly of a Resolution on "Seizing the Opportunities Offered by Safe, Seoude, eliable Artificial Intelligence Systems for Sustainable Development".
