It would be important to wor. closely with other inter-agency bodies to push this integration further. %inally, he stressed the 1 io; 23 implementation matri= shared with the 89 system by the 'G last August needs to be updated and encouraged all to launch new initiatives on the follow-up to 1 io; 23. 7 \* 'A will see. updates from all \*+\* 'A Plus members on such new initiatives and progress to .eep updating 0 ember 'tates.

, n the 'I7' +onference, I, 0 stressed that in addition to a mitigation strategy, an adaptation strategy of orderly and planned migration could move people out of harmEs way. Therefore I, 0 proposes adaptation strategies as an integral component of the preparation for the 'I7' conference.

<u>5 (e Con)ener</u> noted that the upcoming & igh Devel 7 ialogue on 0 igration and 7 evelopment in the GA was encouraging. & owever, providing solid inputs on migration to the post-234> development agenda would be a challenge especially so, since it is a cross-cutting issue. & e informed \*+\* 'A Plus of an initiative by Italy to reduce the transaction costs of remittances. Italy would li.e to e=pand this initiative to the \*uropean 8 nion.

<u>15=</u> stressed that the e=pansion in access and ready availability of I+Ts have redefined the oblective and how development oblectives may be achieved. IT 8 urged that I+T for development be included in the wor. of the , ? G and be mainstreamed in the 89 system. IT 8 mentioned that it had launched a report along with +I'+, during the &igh Devel 'egment of \*+, ', + that ma.es a strong case for the role of broadband in advancing development. It called for including broadband in post-234> where they should be given greater prominence as catalyst for economic and social development. IT 8 is also providing capacity building to '17'

<u>5 (e Con)ener</u> informed that the 1 eport of the 'ecretary-GeneralEs &DP was welcomed by 0 ember 'tates and the general reaction of the , ? G was also positive. &owever, since the &DPEs report was not driven by an inter-governmental process, 0 ember 'tates will not provide a collective response. The 'pecial \*vent of the General Assembly to be held on the  $2>^{th}$  of 'eptember will provide an opportunity for 0 ember 'tates to realize that they have two years to go to achieve the 0 7 Gs. As the international community has begun to devote its attention to the post-234> agenda, accelerating progress towards the 0 7 Gs will be the main focus of the 'pecial \*vent. It will also provide an opportunity to clarify relationships between the different streams of wor. underta.en by the 8 9 system.

<u>5 (e Con)ener</u> agreed that the role and functions of 1+s were important, especially in integrating the three dimensions of sustainable development and the \*+\* 'A platform could be used to bring this role to prominence and to ensure sharing of ideas and best practices. &e recommended that the 8.9 system assign a more prominent role to the regional commissions. , n issues pertaining to statistics, he mentioned that many principals are .eenly aware about the importance of data but also about the limitation of e=isting data. 8.9.7\* 'AEs statistical division had been as .ed to beef up information and the +onvener promised to share the 0.08 mentioned by \* '+AP to all Principals.

<u>, A 8</u> mentioned that while the 8 9 system is e=pected to provide support for indicators for a post-234> agenda- this agenda is still being defined. Fet, the 8 9 system must begin its wor. now to consider indicators rather than wait for the post-234> development agenda to be defined. &owever, to maintain its credibility the system must revisit and address mista.es made in the past, especially indicators. , n the '7 Gs, %A, stressed that the 1 io; 23 had provided a strong mandate and the sustainable development agenda could be the basis for a different transformative vision for the world as a whole.

<u>8 \* C \* 1</u> stated that sustainable development cannot be reduced to social economic development. &uman rights provisions permeate the outcome of 1 io; 23 yet, the international community continues to lag behind on issues pertaining to human rights. As we try to move towards an integrated approach the 89 system needs to be /uite e=plicit on human rights. Indeed, the 89 system has embraced this in a historic way. The 89TT, national consultations, as well as the thematic consultations had all discussed human rights. The 1eports of the &igh Devel Panel of \*minent Persons on Post 234> and the '7'9 also mention discuss human rights, as have the , ? G on '7Gs. , &+&1 proposed that human rights be a fourth dimension of the '7Gs.

<u>5 (e Con)ener</u> cautioned that while issues on human rights are being discussed among 0 ember 'tates, there are a lot of inputs for suggested goals. 0 ember 'tates have given themselves the mandate of defining goals that are limited in number, easy to communicate, measurable, universal and yet, adaptable to uni/ue national circumstances. Therefore, the cluster of goals is li.ely to be .ept at a minimum of 43. ? ithin these clusters many elements are li.ely to be s/ueezed in.
